



A RICH HISTORY

Greenville was originally inhabited by Cherokee Native Americans before European settlers arrived in the 18th century.

The city's name is derived from Revolutionary War general Nathanael Greene, who played a significant role in the war effort.

TEXTILE CAPITAL OF THE WORLD

Greenville played a prominent role in the textile industry during the late 19th and early 20th centuries, earning it the nickname "The Textile Capital of the World." The Peace Center, a renowned performing arts venue in Greenville, was built on the site of a former textile mill and has become a cultural hub for the city.

ARTS IN GREENVILLE

The arts scene in Greenville, SC is vibrant and diverse, offering a range of cultural experiences for residents and visitors alike. The Greenville County Museum of Art stands out as a premier institution. You can find a thriving schedule of performing arts at The Peace Center, The Greenville Symphony Orchestra, Warehouse Theatre and Centre Stage. The "Mice on Main" sculpture series, featuring nine bronze mice hidden along Main Street, adds a whimsical touch to the downtown area.

WEATHER & CLIMATE

The weather in Greenville, SC, is generally characterized by mild winters, warm summers, and a moderate climate overall. With four distinct seasons, Summer in Greenville (June to August) is hot and humid, with temperatures often reaching the 90s°, while Winter (December to February) is relatively mild, with occasional cold snaps and average temperatures ranging from the 40s° to the 60s°. Thunderstorms are common during the summer months, but rainfall is relatively evenly distributed across the seasons. While snowfall is less frequent in Greenville compared to areas further north, it is not uncommon to have a few snow events during the winter months. However, snow accumulation is usually minimal and does not last for an extended period.

THE OUTDOORS

The mild climate of Greenville allows for a wide range of outdoor activities year-round. From hiking in the nearby mountains during the pleasant spring and fall seasons to enjoying water activities on nearby lakes during the summer, there are ample opportunities to explore and enjoy the outdoors. The Swamp Rabbit Trail, a 22-mile multi-use trail, follows the route of a former railway line and is a popular spot for walking, running, and cycling enthusiasts.

- The City of Greenville has a Population of 70,720.
- Falls Park on the Reedy, a 32-acre park in downtown Greenville, was developed in the 20th century and is home to the iconic Liberty Bridge, offering stunning views of the falls.
- Greenville's Main Street was revitalized in the 1970s and has since become a bustling district with a vibrant mix of shops, restaurants, and entertainment venues.
- The Greenville County Museum of Art houses an impressive collection of American art, including works by renowned artists such as Andrew Wyeth and Jasper Johns.
- Greenville is home to several annual festivals and events, including the Greenville Scottish Games, Artisphere, and Fall for Greenville, attracting visitors from near and far to celebrate the city's vibrant culture.
- Greenville, SC, has a relatively low tax burden compared to many other areas in the United States and property taxes are assessed at the county level.

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PICTURE YOURSELF IN THE UPSTATE and other popular locales

The Upstate region of South Carolina serves as a gateway to several points of interest.

Nestled at the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains, it offers easy access to stunning natural landscapes, including nearby state parks and the scenic Blue Ridge Parkway. Additionally, Greenville's central location places it within a convenient 1–3 hour drive of major cities such as Columbia, Atlanta, and Charlotte and only 3–4 hours from the beaches on the coast.



WHAT'S AROUND GREENVILLE?

"The Upstate" is comprised of 6 counties: Oconee, Pickens, Anderson, Greenville, Spartanburg, and Laurens. Greenville County has the highest population in the state, with 525,534 residents. The towns featured below are all within about 35 minutes of downtown Greenville.

PICKENS

Pickens is known for its small-town charm, picturesque surroundings, and rich historical heritage. It has the closest proximity to Lake Keowee, Lake Jocassee & the Blue Ridge Mountains.

EASLEY

Easley is a quickly developing community with a vibrant downtown area and convenient access to both Greenville & Clemson.

POWDERSVILLE

Located just outside Greenville, Powdersville is a rapidly growing suburban community with convenient access to all of the Upstate and lower Anderson County taxes.

CLEMSON

Home to Clemson University, this college town offers a lively atmosphere, beautiful lakefront views, and a strong sense of Tiger pride.

TRAVELERS REST

Travelers Rest is a picturesque town known for its outdoor recreation opportunities, including the popular Swamp Rabbit Trail and a vibrant downtown scene. Home to Furman University & less than an hour to Asheville, NC

GREER

Greer has a "Hallmark Channel" downtown, with a charming ambiance & diverse dining options. It's home to GSP airport, is 15 minutes from BMW and between Greenville & Spartanburg

ANDERSON

Small town with a revitalized downtown area, numerous parks, and a thriving arts community. Anderson is independent from the Greenville ecosystem (35 minutes from downtown) and it's growing quickly. Thriving industrial job opportunities – home to Michelin, Bosch, & Ryobi **\$286k

SPARTANBURG

Spartanburg is a small city (35 min to Greenville) with a thriving arts scene, cultural events, diverse dining options, easy access to GSP airport and is home to the BMW manufacturing plant **\$252k

SIMPSONVILLE

Located off I-385, Simpsonville is the fastest growing suburb of Greenville, with highly ranked schools, a lively downtown area, and convenient access to shopping on Woodruff rd.

FOUNTAIN INN

As the southern extension of Simpsonville, Fountain Inn is home to the upstate's newest HS. It's the most convenient town for people who need access to both Greenville (25min) & Columbia (1hr).



LAKE HARTWELL

LAKE JOCASSEE



The lake's 75 miles of shoreline and approximately 7,500 acres are dotted with secluded coves, sandy beaches, towering waterfalls, and Devil's Fork State Park. With only a limited number of homesites on the lake, it's a mostly untouched oasis in the mountains


